Their photographs will then be shown at the CP+ fair in Japan from 13 to 16 February 2014.

Romain Laurendeau is a committed, passionate, talented and brave photographer who unstintingly defends what he believes in. As we know, reportage photography is in crisis. Romain knows that the press seldom publishes black and white photographs nowadays. And yet this does not discourage him as he follows gold prospectors in the village of Tenkoto in Senegal, a remote spot where he can get a close-up view of humanity. Now 38, Romain studied photography at the ETPA in his hometown of Toulouse. His strength may relate to the fact that he recovered from an illness that almost blinded him: in 2009 a cornea transplant saved his life, and he felt he was reborn into photography. Since then he has tirelessly documented the world with a style and approach that is his and his alone.

Last February Jérôme Blin sent me his photographs of teenagers. I had never heard of this forty-year old photographer from Nantes, a member of a small collective called Bellavieza. As I looked at the pictures I was struck by the pervasive sense of boredom that cannot be shaken off by these ordinary youngsters living in ordinary suburbs and country areas. You get an impression of endless days spent smoking and wandering aimlessly through streets lined with depressing suburban houses, or sitting in bars where the same music is played again and again. I soon contacted him and urged him to enter the photos for the Zoom Awards at the Salon de la Photo, because I feel his work shows a real talent beginning to emerge and a particular style that should be encouraged. He told me he'd come late to photography, at the age of 32, after spending his early career working in industrial maintenance in the Vendée region. He found it very tough working as a freelance photographer for the national and local press, but would never go back to his former life. With this series, which he began working on in 2010 and which is now being extended thanks to a residency at the Maison des Arts in Saint-Herblain, he has chosen a difficult path. Photographing the everyday lives of teenagers devoid of obvious photogenic features in depersonalized settings in France (rather than in a far-off land where image rights don't exist) reflects a special kind of ambition. It deserves our support so that Jérôme Blin can continue exploring his subject and produce a major account of the lives of ordinary youths in the countryside and suburbs around Nantes.
