A group exhibition, the organization of which has been assigned to Marie Magnier and Charlotte Boudon, offers us a body of pictures including photos, videos and clips. These ladies invite us to discover the various emotions of the body through the eyes of great artists. Artist Éric Poupy will be eye to eye with photographer Henrike Stahl, who will make us enter their "world". Not to mention the image-centred transmission projects that complete the rich programme of this year's *Portrait(s)* festival.

We will be delighted to share with you a number of street theatre and musical performances at the festival opening, and cultural encounters related to *Portrait(s)* photography all summer long.

Thank you to the Photographers and the artists. A big thank you to the *Portrait(s)* teams in Vichy and Paris who work hard every day to ensure that this photography festival sticks to its route, and in particular to the City Council of Vichy, Vichy Culture and the Convention Centre, the set designers and the technical teams. AU PROGRAMME

Portrait(s) celebrates its tenth anniversary this year!

On this special occasion, *Portrait(s)* occupies the Convention Centre where the inside exhibitions will be staged. This emblematic city site, located at the centre of the thermal park, takes its place alongside the other festival exhibition sites located outside: the esplanade along Lac d'Allier, Place Saint-Louis, and the station square. Thirteen exhibitions make up the rich photographic adventure being proposed for this, its tenth anniversary, with one new encounter taking place at the heart of the festival, *La voix du regard (The Voice of the Gaze)*, an audio/visual carte blanche.

Lac d'Allier esplanade

A retrospective. Through a combination of the photographic portrait, the pictorial tradition and the taste of staging and costume, **Omar Victor Diop** mixes practices and builds a work that is both seductive and political, one committed to a salutary re-evaluation of the history of Black people.

Convention Centre

Impertinent and humorous, **Meryl Meisler** plunges us into a captivating city and times, 1970s and 1980s New York. Her shots celebrate disco evenings and strip-tease clubs, her Jewish family and Long Island suburb, or life in a high school in one of the roughest Brooklyn neighbourhoods. **Henrike Stahl** and **Éric Poupy**, a photographer and a designer, present an immersive installation combining photographs and drawings. The hybrid practices of this duo play at the centre and on the edge, on oneness and division, all at the same time. Their graphic, poetic images invite the onlooker to modify their point of view on photography and the world... For two years, **Kourtney Roy** studied the land along Highway 16 in Canada, also known as the Highway of Tears, where Indigenous women have mysteriously been disappearing for over forty years. Here she photographs a pile of undergrowth, there a service station or a solitary house, simultaneously stepping into landscape and memory.

Charlotte Boudon and Marie Magnier, from the Galerie Les filles du calvaire, make the festival swing this year by offering a choice of photos, videos and clips all about the body in motion. From Charles Fréger's wahine girls to Jeanette Beckman's break dancers, welcome to the dance! With his series Circesque, Christian Tagliavini gives body to a stunning galaxy of circus performers who live in his imagination before they bring life to his compositions, which pair off the angel and the buffoon, the beautiful and the strange. From his side, Alain Willaume produces a mysterious work that blurs our certainties. Everyone sees in it the reflection of their own questions about our time... Poised between marvel and menace, appeasement and dissidence, his world already depicts the afterworld, when calm waters are the reverse of troubled waters. Olivier Culmann, a photographer and collector with a profound knowledge of India, has brought together an astounding combination of black and white portraits from the Komath Studio, a photo studio in Kochi, Kerala. These pictures, which spread over more than fifty years, bear witness to the strict codes governing portraits in Indian studios.

Place Saint-Louis

Through the casual British acknowledgement *Life actually*, **The Anonymous Project** provides a selection of intimate moments and family portraits from its rich collection of Kodachrome colour prints. These sometimes comical, sometimes worrying situations tell the story of our lives and more about our common points and our humanity. They are an unfiltered, honest, joyful celebration of life.

Des mots pour voir (Words to See)

Portrait(s) and the Neuflize OBC Enterprise Foundation are pursuing the innovative projet that was launched in 2018: to bring the treasures of the Neuflize OBC Enterprise Collection to the knowledge of the general public, a device for analytic encounters about the works to encourage an open, ongoing dialogue between members of the public, academics, experts and artists. This year, three works by **Valérie Belin** are being shown at the festival. Public comments gathered by the mediator over the exhibition will be circulated in the exhibition room.

La voix du regard (The Voice of the Gaze)

On this, its tenth anniversary, Portrait(s) is launching a new photography encounter by inviting **Brigitte Patient** to an audio/visual carte blanche. Brigitte Patient's unique words devote themselves to hearing, in dialogue with a photograph by British photographer Trish Murtha, a story about sustaining curiosity and arousing the desire to see....

8th Photography Residency

This year's photography residency has been awarded to French artist **Christophe Acker** who has worked with the students at Vichy dance schools, a horsewoman and an acrobat to create the astounding offer of a "danced" visit around the city through photographs and film stills that are on show at the station square, and a film being shown at the Convention Centre.

Portrait(s) invites itself to school

This exhibition, which is another of the festival's teaching projects, will feature works by ninth-grade students at the Collège des Célestins produced under the supervision of the festival's mediator team, on the theme of "the seamy side of décor".

MERYL MEISLER

QUIRKYVISION

Inspired by Diane Arbus and Jacques-Henri Lartigue, Meryl Meisler, who was born in 1951, studied with legendary photographer Lisette Model before documenting her own life, with her camera screwed to her quirky eye. It was only when she retired from being a teacher in 2010 that she began releasing her archives, which led to the creation of this event. As time capsules of New York in the seventies and eighties, her shots are a simultaneous celebration of discos and strip clubs, her Jewish family and Long Island suburb, or intermediate school life in one of Brooklyn's toughest neighborhoods. Impertinent and comical, Meryl Meisler captures in black and white or colour moments of pure joy at the centre of daily hardships, plunging us into a fascinating time and city.

HENRIKE STAHL ÉRIC POUPY

LOOK ON LIFE

How do you look at the world gently? How do you reveal the multiple identities within each of us? How do you assemble the pictures of our collective memory? Henrike Stahl is a photographer and an artist. Éric Poupy is an artistic director and a designer. They live together and create, each from his own side, in a world they share in common. Combining photographs and drawings, returning to hybrid practices – cut-outs, superimpositions, painting on prints, printing on silk – this duo creates, using all four hands, an installation in which pictures are spread out in space so that the visitor has an experience located both at the centre and on the edge, in oneness and slitting, in the real and the fictitious, in beauty and the strange, all at one and the same time. Their graphic, poetic images invite us to change our point of view on photography and the world....

COMMISSARIAT CHARLOTTE BOUDON & MARIE MAGNIER

The Paris gallery Les filles du calvaire, which is run by Charlotte Boudon and Marie Magnier, will make the festival swing this year with a dynamic connection on the theme of the body in motion. From the gently swaying wahine girls being observed by Charles Fréger to shots of musicians on stage or being staged by Evelyne Coutas, Renaud Monfourny or Janette Beckman, from the grammar of gestures captured by Nelli Palomäki or Katrien de Blauwer to the overwhelming dancer performances caught by Denis Darzacq or Peter Moore, all the media – photos, videos, clips - are called upon to bring the public into dance.

CHRISTIAN TAGLIAVINI

CIRCESQUE

Acrobats. Jugglers. Tightrope walkers. Escape artists. All leaping out without a safety net, taking risks we'd never dare to take in our own lives. Embodying our dream of being way up high and our fear of falling. With their red noses, their costumes and their spangles, they fall down and always get back up. Photographic craftsman Christian Tagliavini brings them to life through handmade props, tailor-made costumes, well-staged scenes and carefully designed sketches. These circus characters live in his imagination before they enliven his compositions, which pair off the angel and the buffoon, the beautiful and the strange as mates.



KOMATH STUDIO

They go to the local photo studio as a couple, as a family or one by one. They often form strange groups on these pictures as if the photographer had erased the difference between brothers, friends or husbands and wives, as if the fact of systematically lightening the skin colour of each of them made it possible to fit in with western canons. The stunning portraits collected by Olivier Culmann, a photographer and collector with a profound knowledge of India, are the work of Jayaprakash Komath, who has owned the Komath Studio, in Kochi, Kerala, since 1969. His pictures bear witness to the strict codes governing portraits in Indian studios.

CHRISTOPHE ACKER

ONE MORE DANCE

BEFORE THEY TAKE THE LIGHT AWAY

Director Christophe Acker is attending the residency of this tenth festival, proposing a film that looks at the city of Vichy through dance and movement in order to see it as a body, a living system. The heart of the city, its arteries, its nervous centre, its parks and gardens like lungs, so many organicist, even animist metaphors that liken the urban space to an organism from a physical as well as a functional point of view, which Christophe Acker uses to create a pulse within the city.

Together with choreographer Johana Malédon, he has passed from one district to another, encountering Vichy people, dance school and horse riding students, shifting the lines and casting light on the ties that operate between body movement and architectural lines. His work offers a unique view of the city.

ALAIN WILLAUME

BETWEEN TWO WORLDS

Alain Willaume's photographs blur our certainties. Everyone sees in them the reflection of their own questions about our time... The frozen waters of the Neva that crackle beneath the feet of the walker are the augury of spring or perhaps the more worrying foreboding of climate warming. The holiday-makers he photographs stretched out on the beach expose themselves to the sun's caress as much as to its burning. A young woman wearing a flower bouquet on her bosom and a dull scarf on her face sends contradictory signals: rebelliousness or sisterliness? Alienation or conciliation? Poised between beauty and menace, appeasement and dissidence, the world of Alain Willaume already depicts the afterworld, when calm waters are the reverse of troubled waters.

OMAR VICTOR DIOP

RÉTROSPECTIVE NEW VOICES OF AFRICA

Through a combination of the photographic portrait, the pictorial tradition and the taste of staging and costume, Omar Victor Diop mixes practices and builds a work that is more political than it appears. Paying homage to forgotten great African figures, casting light on the resistance movements that have involved Black people in the world for two hundred years, or raising the question through allegorical images of the environmental stakes facing Africa, the work of this Senegalese artist engages in a salutary re-evaluation of history in order to redefine "the place of the Black man and the Black woman in the past and the present".

KOURTNEY ROY

THE OTHER END OF THE RAINBOW

Highway 16, 720 km. long, crosses northern British Columbia, in Canada. For more than forty years, women have disappeared down this road, known as the Highway of Tears. Kourtney Roy returned to these places over two years, photographing a pile of undergrowth here and a service station or solitary house there, taking portraits of close friends and relatives of the missing women, and thus simultaneously stepping into landscape and memory. In this way, she has travelled up a mysterious highway that is also a place of interrogation and accusation, because these unidentified missing persons were mostly Indigenous women whose fate does not particularly concern the nation as a whole. Nonetheless, for several years now, victims' families have formed associations or groups that now actively demand that these unidentified missing persons be recognized and that investigations be opened or reopened.

WORDS TO SEE VALÉRIE BELIN

PRESENTED WITH THE SUPPORT OF NEUFLIZE OBC ENTERPRISE FOUNDATION

The Neuflize OBC Enterprise Foundation is pleased to present *Words to See*, an exhibition featuring works from the Neuflize OBC photography and videography collection

Portrait(s) and the Foundation pursue the innovative project they launched in 2018, of bringing the treasures of this collection to the knowledge of the general public. An opportunity for analysing the works and exchanging ideas about them is being offered to encourage an open, ongoing dialogue between members of the public, academics, experts and artists, with the help of a mediator.

This year, three works by the artist Valérie Belin will be on show for the entire duration of the festival. Comments collected by the mediator from members of the public over the exhibition will be distributed in the exhibition hall.

Moved by an obsessional desire for "the appropriation of the real", Valérie Belin points her lens at the surface of objects and beings all the batter to reveal their density and enigmatic character. Her work develops through a series of pictures based on a subtle game of repetition and variation. In her *Michael Jackson* series, Valérie Belin specifically addresses the theme of the simulacrum. The people being photographed want to be lookalikes of the American pop singer, but from the very start the nature of their model undermines this exercise in resemblance. An eminently protean figure, a master of transformation and appearance, Michael Jackson is no more than a copy of himself. Thus, by photographing imitations of this singer, Valérie Belin is pointing at the vertigo of representation in which the true and the false, the authentic and the reproduction, the subject and their reflection in the mirror, are all inextricably intertwined.

Seen through the prism of portrait-centred photographic work, the fresh young artists will lead us to discover this atypical place in Vichy.

Their works have been produced under the supervision of our team of mediators, Jérôme Schirtzinger and Christophe Darbelet.

These photographs will be on show at the Vichy Convention Centre, at the heart of the rich adventure trail of the festival's exhibitions.


